Spring Carp Fishing on Lake Kegonsa 2020


Once again the commercial carp fishermen were on Lake Kegonsa trying to harvest as many carp as possible. They began fishing two days after the ice was off the lake.

We're sorry to report that COVID-19, and even a muskrat, were working against us this spring. The live fish market in New York was not surprisingly slow this year due to COVID-19. The carp fishermen were still fishing and planned to ship live carp to NY on Friday, 3/27. For a reason that the DNR has still not determined the truck didn't show up. The fishermen decided to keep the carp in the pen until Monday 3/30, when another truck was scheduled to arrive. Over the weekend a muskrat ate through the net and they estimate that they lost 2/3 of the carp in the net. Based on what was probably the market price for live carp this amounted to a loss of over \$20,000 to the fishermen. They took out what they could, but it was not a lot.

In total, the fishermen removed only 62,700 lbs. of carp this spring and because of market conditions they told us they were through for the year. Last year they removed 162,000 lbs. and we were hoping for more this year. The *FOLKS* incentive plan that had been approved by the Board would have paid the fishermen \$27,500 if they had removed 200,000 lbs. of carp this year.

More bad news is that the fish processing company that had taken most of the carp that were not shipped live over the last few years has closed.

We'll work closely with the DNR and the fishermen in an effort to determine what changes have to be made to continue with our removal project in 2021. Unfortunately, most of the major factors are out of our direct control.


Lake Kegonsa Water Levels

As of April 19, 2020 the Lake Kegonsa level is 843.15' (ft above sea level) which is near the summer minimum level of 843.0'. All four of the lakes are within their summer goals.

Per the Dane County website "Summer goals" (starting at the first run off event after March 1st and continuing through November 1st) are to maintain water levels between the summer minimum and summer maximum target levels." For Lake Kegonsa this range is between 843.0' (summer minimum) and 843.5' (summer maximum). This target range for summer is only **6 inches** (1/2 foot) and is very difficult to maintain, however the county has been trying to build capacity to accommodate the spring rains.



FOLKS Aquatic Debris Collection Program

The first year of the aquatic debris collection program was a big success. This program was started by the *FOLKS* Board in May 2019 with the cooperation of Dane County Land and Water Management Resources Department. We had six pick-up weeks in 2019 from May through September. The cost of the program was funded by *FOLKS* from membership dues and contributions. Thanks to all of the lake residents who participated.

The *FOLKS* Board will continue the program in 2020 with six pick-up weeks during the season.

2020 Aquatic Debris Barge Pick-up Schedule

June 15 through 19 July 13 through 17 July 27 through 31 August 10 through 14 August 24 through 28 September 21 through 24

The schedule and program may subject to changes that might be required by COVID-19 restrictions. The following is a summary of how the barge pick-up program works:

- The area the barge will cover includes all of Lake Kegonsa and the Yahara River north to the river bend at the west end of Orvold Park Drive. In other words, it will cover piers on the Yahara River for residences on Orvold Park Drive, Alsmo Lane, and Fish Camp Road.
- Please have all debris on your pier by 6 a.m. Monday of the scheduled pick-up week. The barge crew will start on Monday of the scheduled week and will make ONE complete pass around the lake and river (working through Friday if necessary). It may be a few days until the barge gets to your pier. Assure that the debris is placed in a location at the end of your pier so that the barge can safely and easily access it. If the water adjacent to your pier is too shallow to allow barge access from the water, the crew will not be able to pick up debris from your pier. Maybe you can use your neighbor's pier with their permission, of course. If you don't personally reside at your waterfront property, please inform those who live there of this program.
- A complete pass around the lake and river may require less than a full week. It is possible that urgent County work requirements may take priority over vegetation collection and would require diverting the crew during a given week.
- Material ALLOWED for collection Aquatic vegetation (lake plants, vegetation, algae) and debris washed up on shore (trash, logs, sticks, dead fish, etc.). Only debris that comes from the waterway is allowed.
- Material NOT ALLOWED for collection Yard waste or brush (grass clippings, leaves, tree limbs) and household waste (garbage, pet waste, etc.). In other words, the intention of this program is to remove only debris that comes from the lake.

This program improves the cleanliness of our lake, river, and shorelines. Residents are able to remove debris from the water that is ugly and annoying and that can cause boating hazards and problems as it floats downstream. This enhances the beauty and enjoyable use of our waterways. Thank you for utilizing the program again this year.

FOLKS Partners with the Kegonsa Sanitary District #2 in a New Run Off Reduction Project

Town of Dunn, Kegonsa Sanitary District #2 asked *FOLKS* to assist them with a runoff reduction project near the office at 2240 US Hwy 51. A nearby drainage ditch runs straight into Lake Kegonsa. The district is hoping to plant native plants within this active ditch line to absorb rain water and slow the run-off. Native plants are expected to create a filter before the run-off water enters the lake. *FOLKS* formulated a project plan and will partner with the Kegonsa Sanitary District (KSD) to create native plantings in this runoff area.

Janice Kellogg and Connie Hagen from the *FOLKS* Board and Cindy Lehr from KSD will be heading up this project. KSD and *FOLKS* purchased 280 plants through the Dane Count "Plant Dane" native plant program which will be available May 30, 2020.

The Kegonsa Sanitary District #2 Native Plant Project is expected to be completed in phases over 3 - 4 years.

- We plan to begin the project near the culvert that drains into Lake Kegonsa and continue with phase 2, 3, 4, etc. until the entire drainage area up to Hwy 51 is planted with native plants.
- Plantings will be assessed each year before moving on with the project.
- **FOLKS** measured the ditch area and the cattail area in March 2020 to make a map of the area and provide information for planting plans
- **FOLKS** plans to provide the general planting plan for each projected phase of the project.
- **FOLKS** plans to assess the drainage line area by performing a general observation of the area and measuring the depth of standing water on a weekly basis, if possible
- There is a large stand of cattails in the drainage ditch near Hwy 51. Cattails are not native plants and currently seem to be slowing the drainage through the culverts. Volunteers will remove cattail heads in 2020 whenever they form. We plan to leave the cattail stalks for the first year and reevaluate for 2nd- 4th year. We'll discuss cattail removal with WDNR and plan to remove when appropriate.
- When cattails are removed, replace any rocks near the culverts and grade the area to have a continuous downward slope so it does not have standing water.
- We'll reevaluate the plantings on a regular basis and revise the plan based on this information.



FOLKS Partners with the Kegonsa Sanitary District #2, continued

Phase 1 – Spring Planting, March to June 2020:

We plan to start Phase 1 downstream near the rock pile and culvert where it drains directly into Lake Kegonsa.

- For Phase 1 we anticipate completing a section of native plants approximately 8' wide and 40' long near the lake culvert.
- The native plants should be planted about 1' apart so KSD and *FOLKS* purchase 280 native plants in March that will be available for planting May 30th.
- Native plants purchased for Phase 1 include forbs (Milkweed, Wild Bergamot, Mountain Mint, Blue Vervain), grasses (Virginia Wild Rye and Prairie Dropseed) and sedges (Bebb's Sedge, Bottlebrush Sedge and Brown Fox Sedge).
- Coco matting will be used over the grass to hold native plants in place and impede the underlying vegetation until the native plants are established.
- Plants will be picked up Saturday, May 30th and we'll plant as soon as we can.
- We need Volunteers for Planting 10-12 Total: 7-8 FOLKS, 3-4 KSD
- KSD will provide occasional watering and weeding in the first year as needed
- Evaluate plantings early August 2020 *FOLKS* and Sanitary District. Additional fall plantings if spring plantings are thriving

Phase 2 - Fall Planting, August to October 2020:

FOLKS and KSD will evaluate Phase 1 plantings in early August 2020. If spring plantings are thriving, we'll proceed with Phase 2 - Fall plantings.

- For Phase 2 we want to complete a second section of native plants approximately 8' wide and 30' long moving from the lake toward Hwy 51.
- This 30' long section will require an additional 210 plants (1' apart)
- For the fall planting we'll request free plants from the Plant Dane native plant program
- We'll also receive additional free plants from *FOLKS* Plant Dane growers (Janice Kellogg and Connie Hagen).
- We'll plan to plant approximately August 15, 2020 and again we'll need 8 to 10 volunteers for planting (6-7 *FOLKS*, 2-3 KSD)

The 50th Anniversary of Earth Day is Wednesday, April 22nd

While our own *FOLKS* Rain Garden workshop had to be cancelled we thought we'd include part of an article from last year on what you can do to help. The 50th Anniversary of Earth Day is April 22nd so anything you do to help our lake and our earth is a positive event. Collectively, we make a huge impact!!!!

What You Can Do to Help Our Lake (from our April 2019 Newsletter)

Storm water runoff from roofs, driveways and streets carries phosphorous and other nutrients into our lakes, rivers and other waterways. As we know, the excess nutrients can fuel algae blooms throughout the summer.

Things You Can Do

- 1. Increase storm water infiltration and keep as much runoff out of the lake as possible
 - Rain Gardens Even a small rain garden will hold an appreciable amount of water during a storm that will then be able to soak in gradually and not run directly to the waterways
 - **Rain Barrels** Capturing storm water in a barrel and using it to water lawns and gardens is an effective way of reducing runoff
 - Downspouts Directing downspouts to gardens and grassy areas instead of impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks and patios allows the storm water time to infiltrate
 - **Shoreline Buffer Gardens** Planting native plants with deep roots along the shoreline keeps the water from running directly into the lake or river
- 2. Keep storm water that goes into the lake and waterways as clean as possible
 - Keep leaves, grass clippings, soil and other debris out of the storm sewers. Use the Towns' leaf collection and compost sites, mulch leaves onto your lawn or start your own compost pile.
 - Try not to use chemicals or fertilizers in your yard and gardens
 - Dispose of oil or other chemicals properly and don't let them drain into the storm sewers
 - Monitor construction sites near you and notify Dane County Water Resource Engineering if you think there's a problem.
 - Work with farmers and other individuals to identify properties for buffer strip plantings, retention ponds and other clean water techniques.

3. Actively support work on lake quality issues by Dane County and other organizations such as *FOLKS*, Clean Lakes Alliance, Dane County Land & Water Resources and Ripple-Effects.
